First backglass. 1936 - Alternating current pinballs made by multiple manufacturers. 1941 - Pinball production ceases as manufacturers convert to World War II production. 1946 - Pinball production resumes. Williams Mfg. founded by Harry Williams. 1947 - HUMPTY-DUMPTY (D. Gottlieb & Co.) First flippers. 1948 - Bally Mfg. introduces pop bumpers (thumper bumpers - jet bumpers). 1951 - D. Gottlieb & Co. introduces slingshots (kickers). 1954 - SUPER JUMBO (D. Gottlieb & Co.) First four player pinball machine. 1956 - BALLS-A-POPPIN' (Bally Mfg.) First multi-ball machine. 1957 - Wooden cabinet legs and rails replaced by steel. 1960 - FLIPPER (D. Gottlieb & Co.) First add-a-ball pinball machine and first "extra ball". 1960 - MAGIC CLOCK (Williams Mfg.) First moving target. 1962 - VAGABOND (Williams Mfg.) First drop targets. 1966 - SIX STICKS (Bally Mfg.) First six player pinball machine. 1966 - BAZAAR (Bally Mfg.) First game with zipper flippers. 1968 - Williams Mfg. standardizes larger flippers. 1971 - CHALLENGER (D. Gottlieb & Co.) First head-to-head 2 player pinball machine. 1972 - Pinball legalized in Los Angeles, California after 33 year absence. 1975 - DYN'O MITE (Allied Leisure) First hybrid solid state/electromechanical pinball game. 1975 - SPIRIT OF '76 (Mirco Games) First totally electronic solid state pinball machine. 1976 - Pinball legalized in New York and Chicago after 35 year absence. 1977 - ATARIANS (Atari) First wide-body pinball machine. 1977 - EIGHT BALL (Bally Mfg.) Sets post war record sales of 20,230 units. 1977: Allied Leisure releases "Take Five", first cocktail pinball machine 1979 - GORGAR (Williams Mfg.) First talking pinball machine. 1980 - FIREPOWER (Williams Mfg.) First solid state multi-ball pinball machine. 1980 - BLACK KNIGHT First two level playfield, first Magna-Save feature.

1980: Stern releases "Big Game", first game to have 7-digit
(over 1,000,000 points) digital scoring.

1981 - HAUNTED HOUSE (D. Gottlieb & Co.) First three level pinball machine.

1981 - CATACOMB First pinball game with vertical and horizontal playfields. 1982 - CAVEMAN (D. Gottlieb & Co.) First combination video game/pinball machine. 1984 - D. Gottlieb & Co. pinball sold to Columbia Pictures, then Mylstar, then Premier Electronics. 1984 - LASER CUE - First machine to display four highest scores 1984 - LASER CUE - First machine with guaranteed time for an extra ball 1985 - First Pinball Expo. 1987 - LASER WAR (Data East) First stereo sound. 1988 - Bally Mfg. sold to Williams Electronics. 1989 - ROBO COP (Data East) First solid state flippers. 1992 - Alvin G. & Co. start pinball production. 1994 - Data East Pinball sold to Sega. 1994 - Alvin G. & Co. closes. 1995 - Capcom Pinball makes it's first pinball PINBALL MAGIC.

1996 - Premier Electronics closes, Capcom and Sega Pinball merge,

1999 - Stern acquires Sega Pinball.
